On-mountain reservations are required for mountain access and current availability is updated online here. Week-of reservations are released on Wednesdays at 2 p.m. MT for the next nine days.

Lift tickets will be limited this season, so the best way for guests to access the mountains is with a pass. The Epic Pass, Epic Local Pass, Epic Day Pass and entire suite of pass products, each providing unbeatable value, go off sale Sunday, Dec. 6.
